18/04/1903 The Jolly Collier Inn, Two Gates

The Jolly Collier Inn, Two Gates

18th April 1903 - At the Warwickshire Quarter Sessions last week (as already reported briefly), John Spooner, tenant of the Jolly Collier Inn, Two Gates, Wilnecote, appealed against the refusal of the Tamworth Magistrates to renew his license.-- Mr. Parfitt and Mr. Joy were for the justices. and Mr. Young, K.C, and Mr. McCardie for the appellant.-- Mr. Parfitt said the license was objected to on the ground that the premises were not structurally adapted, and were not required. There were three other full-licenses and an off-license within about 350 yards, and the population was only 263. The Tamworth magistrates were equally divided on the subject, and as they refused to adjourn, the refusal of the license was a necessary consequence.--P.s. Harrison gave evidence as to the low ceilings of the inn, and said the accommodation was considerably worse than at other licensed houses in the place. -- Cross examined: Witness admitted that the appellant signified his willingness to the Tamworth Bench to build a new house if the license were renewed.--Mr. Young urged that the appellant should be allowed to bring the house up to the standard required saying that no previous warning had been given him to do so. He called the owner of the house, Mr. Freeland, to state that he was willing to carry out any alterations which were thought necessary, -- Mr. Parfitt: I have no doubt that what was at the bottom of the minds of the magistrates was that the place was a bad one, and should be altered .-- The Chairman said the Court had come to the conclusion, considering what had taken place at the licensing meeting that the ought to allow the appeal and grant the license for this year, with a view to the whole question of structure and surroundings being reconsidered by the Tamworth justices. They took it that, before the license expired, the whole question would have been considered by the justices and they presumed that what the latter required with regard to the structure and surroundings would be complied with. If the Court found next year that the justices' requirements had not been complied with the state of affairs would be very different.

15/01/1950 Ladies Darts Party Ladies' Darts team annual party.

15th January 1950 - Members of the Two Gates W.M.C. ladies' darts team, with their husbands and friends, at the annual party in the clubroom on Saturday evening.

After the company of 60 had enjoyed a meat tea provided by the committee, Mrs. S. Walters (committee chairman) opened the programme by wishing everyone happiness and success in 1950.

Chairman of the club (Mr. Syd Clempson) paid tribute to the work of the ladies' darts team during the past 12 months, particularly with the monetary assistance given in connection with the children's field day fund and the old folk's fund. He expressed the thanks of all present for an excellent tea and concluded by wishing the ladies' darts team every success for the future.

Mr.J.Heathcote (vice-chairman), who seconded the vote of thanks, handed a donation to the ladies' treasurer (Mrs.C.Grazier).

The silver cup was then presented to the champion of the season (Mrs.A.Dennis). The runner-up was Mrs.Sml.Clempson.

A parade of the fancy dress competitors followed, prizes being won by Mrs. G. Thompson ("Twenty Questions") and Mr.C.Stevenson ("Violet Elizabeth"). The rest of the evening was then taken up with impromptu turns by several members present. Mr.K.Hughes (accordionist) was the accompanist.



16/08/1957

Braille Writing

Braille writing demonstrations at Two Gates W.M.C

16th August 1957 -- Although collections for the blind have been held at Two Gates Working Men's Club for several months it was not until quite recently that it was decided to purchase Braille writing machines for blind children.

During the past two months the club has sent four machines to a school for blind children at Dorton Seale. The cost of these machines is over £13, but as the club buy them as a presentation they are available at £4 9s.

The idea was conceived by Mr. J.T.Lewis, a railway worker who moved to Two Gates recently from Cardiff. When the first machine was bought it was displayed in the club for members to see what they had contributed towards.

Demonstration

And at the club on Friday a demonstration of the workings of the machines was given by Miss Lago of the Starr Inn, Tamworth.

A teacher who not only looks after the children's welfare but also teaches them how to write, Miss Lago said the type of machine the club had given was the best available.

Miss Bernadette Lewis presented Miss Lago with a bouquet. A vote of thanks was proposed by the chairman. Mr.R.Coffin.

There have been enquiries from other clubs in the district who seem interested in carrying out a similar service.



07/08/1958 New Club Premises Two Gates Open New Club premises

07th August 1958 - New premises at Two Gates Working Men's Club were opened by Mr. Fred Jackson, of Glascote on Friday last week.

The clubroom stands at the back of the original club, 75 yards from the main road. Representatives present at the opening were Mr. Cox, of Ansells Brewery, Mr. Freeman (mineral waters), Mr. D.Cotterill (builder), and members of Wilnecote and Belgrave clubs. Mr. A.Statham (vice-chairman) presided.

Mr. Jackson, who had been the auditor since 1943, gave members a brief history of the club. The old club was originally a public-house which went by the name of "The Jolly Collier."

Mr.C.Wood proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Jackson, who went on to say that the cost of the building had been about £3,500 which had already been paid.

Mr. Wood appealed to members to support the club. He hoped to see the youth club which had started in the old premises develop into something of which Two Gates could be proud.

Mr. Dan Cotterill said that judging by the crowd of over 300 present at the opening, it would not be long before the club required an extension.

Decorations to the room were carried out by Mr. and Mrs. M Faulkner. The club stands in its own grounds of four and a half acres with access from the A5 and Dosthill road.

Furnishings were by Messrs. Lewis's of Birmingham, and curtains and fittings were carried out by Tamworth Industrial Co-Operative Society, Ltd.

The rooms were gaily decorated for the occasion. Each old person received a £1 note and a parcel of groceries, and had their choice of free drinks during the evening. Members raised the money for the party by competitions and a dinner service was given by the secretary raised a large sum. The efforts were so successful that they were able to present Councilor Cyril Wood, the secretary and organiser, with a cheque for £20 towards the Two Gates and Mount Pleasant new year party for old folks in January. Entertainment was provided by George Forbes and his band.

16/06/1972 Extension Opens £50,000 extension opens.

13th June 1972 -- Extensions costing £50,000 at Two Gates Working Men's Club brought praise for far sighted committee members at the official opening on Tuesday night.

The praise was voiced by guest speakers led by Tamworth's Mayor, Alderman Bill Newbury, who performed the opening ceremony by turning a key in the new entrance doors.

In a pact concert room later he congratulated club officials and committee members on going ahead with the ambitious scheme, bringing the premises up to the standards needed for the 70s.

Alderman Newbury, who was introduced by club president, Mr. John Goldsworthy said: "Tamworth is undergoing a period of considerable transformation, with new schools, shops and factories appearing.

"This transformation is nowhere more apparent than in out town's licensed clubs."

Until recently, Alderman Newbury said, some licensed clubs in the area had not kept pace with the general improvements in Tamworth. "But this club is now second to none for comfort.", he added.

Main features of the extensions designed in a modern style but using traditional materials is a 60 feet by 40 feet concert room with a full width bar, a large stage with space beneath for furniture storage, and dressing rooms with a stage door entrance for artists.

A new entrance, secretary's office and toilets are also provided.

CHILDREN'S ROOM

The original club building, opened in 1903, has been given a complete face-lift. What was the concert room has become a games room and bar, and the other rooms are now used as a lounge and children's room-- the first at Tamworth Workingmen's club.

Club membership has more than doubled over the last 10 years and the improvement scheme has brought a dramatic influx of new members over the last few weeks.

Secretary, Mr. Geoff Chadwick said "We now have over 600 paid-up members and the number is rising all the time."

At the opening ceremony, which was followed by concert entertainment, architect Mr. Dennis Gwilliam said the design of the new building had been dictated by road widening requirements for the A5 trunk road and Dosthill Road.

"We are grateful for the assistance of officers of Tamworth Borough Council, the County Planning Department and the highway authority and others who had to discuss and agree problems of road widening and layout" he said.

WORTHWHILE

Mr. Gwilliam told members and guests "It is only when you see a building occupied by a lot of people--and a lot of people enjoying themselves--that the whole project becomes really worthwhile."

He said the club could pride itself on a "first-class committee" which had done an excellent job.

Mr. Gwilliam also thanked the general contractors, George Linnecor and son (Midlands) of Wilnecote Lane, Belgrave.

Other speakers were Mr. Charles Havercroft, sales consultant to Davenport Brewery Ltd., one of the club's main suppliers, and Mr. Harry Shaw, chairman of the Warwickshire branch of the club and institute union.

Guests also included Mr. Dennis Lloyd, a director of the building company and Mr. Jim Cook, C.I.U. National Executive Officer.

Colin Grazier



Two Gates born war hero who's heroic efforts changed the course of history Our local newspaper the Tamworth Herald ran a campaign to bring world wide attention to the events of 30th October 1942 and to let the world know about the heroic efforts of Tamworth born Colin Grazier and his two colleagues. The Herald's wonderful campaign won them, quite rightly, the United Kingdom's Campaign of the Year Award 2000 and enough funds were raised to provide a permanent memorial to our war hero. The Tamworth Heritage Trust applauds the efforts of the Tamworth Herald and the Colin Grazier Memorial Committee and is proud to include this very important subject on the website.

An attack by a British destroyer on a German U-boat in the Eastern Mediterranean in October 1942 altered the course of the entire war, and Two Gates born Colin Grazier, along with Lieutenant Tony Fasson and Naafi canteen assistant Tommy Brown, wrote themselves into history. Because of their efforts, the capture of secret German Enigma coding material from U-559, enabled Bletchley Park's codebreakers to crack a new Enigma system introduced to cover a maximum U-boat offensive. Indeed Winston

Churchill hailed the work of Bletchley Park as 'The secret weapon that won the war.'

After ten critical months with no U-boat signals intelligence available, this was the crucial factor in defeating Hitler's Atlantic U-boat wolf packs before they could starve Britain into defeat in the winter of 1942-3. Had it been possible to release the facts of her triumph at the time, the name of HMS Petard would surely have ranked alongside that of Nelson's Victory in the annals of British history. Because of the top secrecy about Ultra messages that lasted nearly



four decades, the Petard's achievement remained unknown, her fame unrecognized.

On the night of 30th October 1942 a Sunderland Flying Boat reported that it was in visual contact with a submarine heading in a westerly direction and then a long battle ensued between HMS Petard and the U-559. It was imperative that they forced the submarine to surface. Eventually the stricken sub appeared in HMS Petards search-lights, after the crew of the German U boat had been evacuated and placed under arrest, the captain of HMS Petard asked for volunteers to go and search the damaged submarine and this is when Lt. Fasson from Jedburgh, Scotland

said that he would go aboard. He stripped off his clothes and jumped into the freezing cold sea. Colin Grazier also volunteered and followed him across. The two men were then joined by 16 year old canteen assistant Tommy Brown, and they began the task of searching the rapidly sinking sub for any vital information. The two senior men, Fasson and Grazier went into the submarine and passed all the information they could get their hands on to the young Brown who was waiting on the conning tower. Suddenly the submarine lurched and slipped beneath the waves, taking Grazier and Fasson to their final resting place. But not before they had passed the vital information that enabled Bletchley Park to crack the Nazi's secret code. Although the brave Tommy survived, he was tragically killed along with his sister in a house fire three years later at his home in North Shields in February 1945.



Colin Grazier and Tony Fasson were later recommended for posthumous awards of the Victoria Cross but the Admiralty, concerned this might draw unwanted attention from German Intelligence, instead ordered posthumous awards of the George Cross, the highest civilian award for bravery. Tommy Brown was awarded the George Medal. Because of the Official Secrets Act, their mission remained a secret for 30 years. Colin Grazier and his two comrades helped save hundreds of thousands of tons of shipping from torpedoing and of course no-one can estimate the countless lives their actions saved. Their deeds that day paved the way for the build up of forces for the Normandy Invasions.

Bletchley Park was arguably the most successful intelligence operation in world history, the top secret workplace of the remarkable people who cracked Germany's vaunted Enigma Code. Almost to the end of the war, the Germans had firm faith in the Enigma ciphering machine, but in fact the codebreakers were deciphering nearly 4,000 German transmissions daily by 1942. It is now recognized that Colin Grazier, Lt. Fasson

and Tommy Brown's efforts shortened World War II by at least 12 months.
